OVERVIEW OF COMMISSION'S KEY ACTIONS AND DECISIONS

Tuesday, October 15, 2019

I. PLENARY SESSION SUMMARY AND OVERVIEW

At the October 15, 2019 meeting conducted in St. Petersburg the Commission considered and decided on Chair's issues and recommendations, Executive Director's announcements and discussions, product and entity approvals, applications for accreditor and course approvals, accessibility waivers, petitions for declaratory statements, and recommendations from the Commission's various committees. In addition, the Commission received a briefing on Binding Interpretations # 169 and #174. Specific actions included voting to: 1.) Approve the updated Workplan/Schedule for the 2020 Code Update Process—7th Edition, Florida Building Code (2020); 2.) Direct staff to provide draft rule language options, and to proceed with the rulemaking process for Rule 61G20-2.002 —Statewide Amendments to the Florida Building Code, and to delegate authority to Thomas Campbell to sign rulemaking documents on behalf of the Commission; 3.) Initiate rulemaking for Rule 61G20-2.001 (Commission Organization and Operations), and to delegate authority to Thomas Campbell to sign rulemaking documents on behalf of the Commission; 4.) Approve funding research project priority #4 (feasibility study only) for fiscal year 2019-2020 based on the TAC Chairs' recommendations, and staff administering and overseeing the research, and to charge staff with negotiating scoping, funding levels, and contracting as appropriate, and to ensure that UF works collaboratively with industry stakeholders on scoping and methodology; 5.) Approve funding research project priority #5 for fiscal year 2019-2020 based on the TAC Chairs' recommendations, and staff administering and overseeing the research, and to charge staff with negotiating scoping, funding levels, and contracting as appropriate, and to ensure that UF works collaboratively with industry stakeholders on scoping and methodology; and, 6.) Approve funding research project priority #6 for fiscal year 2019-2020 based on the TAC Chairs' recommendations, and staff administering and overseeing the research, and to charge staff with negotiating scoping, funding levels, and contracting as appropriate.

II. ACTING CHAIR'S WELCOME

Acting Chair Schock welcomed the Commission, DBPR staff and the public to St. Petersburg and the October 15, 2019 plenary session of the Florida Building Commission.

The Acting Chair noted that in addition to considering regular procedural issues including product and entity approvals, applications for accreditor and course approvals, accessibility waivers, petitions for declaratory statements, and recommendations from the Commission's various committees, the primary focus of the October meeting was to conduct a rule workshop on Rule 61G20-2.002, and decide on funding of remaining proposed research projects.

The Acting Chair explained that if one wished to address the Commission on any of the issues before the Commission they should sign-in on the appropriate sheet(s), and as always, the Commission will provide an opportunity for public comment on each of the Commission's substantive discussion topics. The Acting Chair explained that if one wants to comment on a specific substantive Commission agenda item, they should come to the speaker's table at the appropriate time so the Commission knows they wish to speak. The Acting Chair noted that public input is welcome, but should be offered before there is a formal motion on the floor.

V. APPROVAL OF THE AUGUST 13, 2019 FACILITATOR'S SUMMARY REPORT AND MEETING MINUTES

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to approve the August 13, 2019 Facilitator's Summary Report and Meeting Minutes as posted/presented.

Amendments: There was no amendment offered to the meeting minutes.

VI. CHAIR'S DISCUSSION ISSUES AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Commission Updates

Acting Chair Schock reported that Diana Worrall, the Commission's Persons With Disabilities Representative has resigned effective September 12, 2019. On behalf of the Commission, Jim thanked Diana for her years of service to the citizens of Florida. Diana served two separate appointments on the Commission with her most recent service running from September 23, 2016 – September 12, 2019.

Hurricane Research Advisory Committee

Acting Chair Schock reported that the Hurricane Research Advisory Committee was originally convened in January of 2005 and last met formally in 2012. He announced that he would be reconvening the HRAC with new membership later this year to continue evaluating research for wind and water intrusion enhancements, including UF's and FEMA's hurricane related reports. The HRAC will maintain a balance of perspectives and stakeholders as in the past, and the Acting Chair will decide on membership on this basis. Acting Chair Schock will serve on the Committee, and requested that interested applicants send their resumes to Mo Madani by October 31, 2019. The Acting Chair indicated that he would appoint the HRAC at the Commission's December 10, 2019 meeting in St. Augustine.

Updated Commission Milestones

The Acting Chair reminded participants that the Updated Commission Milestones document is linked to the October 15, 2019 FBC Agenda on the BCIS.

VII. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ANNOUNCEMENTS AND DISCUSSIONS

Tom Campbell, FBC Executive Director, briefed the Commission on the following issues:

Legislative Update

Tom reported that SB 474 has been filed and proposes to reduce the Commission from 27 seats to 19 seats.

New Electronic Travel System

Tom reported that DBPR is using a new electronic system to file travel reports, and signing the voucher is no longer required. The Reimbursement For Travel Expenses Form and travel receipts can be submitted by email or mailed to DBPR.

Future Meetings

Future 2019 Commission Meeting Dates

Tom reported that the December 10, 2019 Commission meeting will be in St. Augustine, at the World Golf Village Renaissance.

VIII. 7th Edition, Florida Building Code (2020) Workplan Update

Mo Madani provided an update regarding the Workplan/Schedule for the development of the 2020 Code Update Process—7th Edition, Florida Building Code (2020).

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment, and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following actions:

Commission Actions:

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 – 0 in favor, to approve the updated Workplan/Schedule for the 2020 Code Update Process—7th Edition, Florida Building Code (2020).

IX. RULES WORKSHOP ON RULE 61G20-2.002 —STATEWIDE AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE

Acting Chair Schock explained the 2019 Legislature amended Section 553.73 (7)(a), Florida Building Code, through passage of HB 447 to reflect that: Every 3 years, the Commission may approve updates to the Florida Building Code without a specific finding that the updates are required to accommodate the specific needs of this state. The Commission is required to amend Rule 61G20-2.002, Statewide Amendments to the Florida Building Code, to reflect this change. At the August 2019 meeting the Commission voted to initiate rulemaking for Rule 61G20-2.002 -Statewide Amendments to the Florida Building Code, and to delegate authority to Thomas Campbell to sign rulemaking documents on behalf of the Commission. Prior to the Rules Workshop stakeholders were requested to provide written comments on proposed revisions to the Rule, and the comments were posted to the BCIS.

At the October 2019 meeting the Commission received public comments, and discussed the public comments regarding proposed changes to the triennial update process and changes to the Commission's adopted code processes, and subsequently discussed any changes they would like to consider regarding the Rule and process documents. Based on the Commission's discussion and the public comments, the Commission then directed staff to bring draft rule options, and amended process documents to the December 10, 2019 meeting for further review and discussion during the Rule Workshop.

Following is a summary of options idenifed by Commission members and staff:

- Code, Chapter, and Section for TAC reviews. (Schiffer)
- Three hearings instead of four during TAC and Commissioner review. (Shock)
- Monograph included with proposed I-code changes. (Shock)
- Removing Florida specific language from first phase requirements. (Shock)
- Working with the insurance industry to get more info about BCEGS. (Shock)
- FHBA proposed rule language provide in their comments as a starting point for rule changes. (Wiseman)
- 2nd TAC review will be allowed to change recommendation instead of just providing comments. (Staff)
- Eliminate mandate of only having motions to approve. (Staff)
- Submitting round 1 Code modifications into system. (Staff)
- Assign individual TAC members a certain amount of modifications to review. (Staff)

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment, and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following actions:

Commission Actions:

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 – 0 in favor, to direct staff to provide draft rule language options, and to proceed with the rulemaking process for Rule 61G20-2.002 —Statewide Amendments to the Florida Building Code, and to delegate authority to Thomas Campbell to sign rulemaking documents on behalf of the Commission.

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to initiate rulemaking for Rule 61G20-2.001 (Commission Organization and Operations), and to delegate authority to Thomas Campbell to sign rulemaking documents on behalf of the Commission.

X. APPROVAL OF REMAINING RESEARCH PROJECTS FOR FY 2019-2020

Acting Chair Schock explained that the Commission has been funding hurricane resistance research based on legislatively approved spending authority since the formation of the Commission's Hurricane Research Advisory Committee in January of 2005. At the August 2013 meeting the Commission voted to expand the funding of research projects to topics beyond the scope of hurricane resistance research and to fund research into other Code related topical areas based on recommendations from the Commission's TACs and has done so since then. At the April 16, 2019 meeting the Commission voted to narrow the scope of Commission funding of research projects for fiscal year 2019/2020 to hurricane resistant research.

At the August 2019 meeting the Commission voted to fund research project priorities # 1, 2, and 3, and authorized staff to work with the Structural TAC to review research project priorities # 4, 5, and 6, and to bring recommendations for the Commission's consideration at the October 2019 meeting. At the August 13, 2019 meeting the Commission voted to fund the following:

Priority #1: Code enhancements for Florida.

Priority #2: Geographic Information System technical assistance in preparing local wind speed line maps for jurisdictions dissected by wind speed line contours.

Priority #3: Code review of the integrated draft for the 7th Edition (2020) FBC.

The Structural TAC met on September 25, 2019 and prioritized the 3 remaining research projects. On October 15, 2019 the Chairman Technical Advisory Committee met to consider the Structural TAC's recommendations, and is recommending the following priority order for funding the remaining 3 projects:

- Priority #4: A Feasability Study for Wind-Driven Rain Tests of Building Envelope Systems up to Hurricane-Strength Wind-Driven Rain Intensity.
- Priority #5: Experimental Evaluation of Pressure Equalization Factors and Wind Resistance of Vinyl Siding Systems Using a Multi-Chamber Pressure Test Bed.
- Priority #6: Hurricane Michael Data Enhancement (Phase II), Performance of Modular Houses and Review of FEMA Recovery Advisory.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment, and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following actions:

Commission Actions:

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 – 0 in favor, to approve funding research project priority #4 (feasibility study only) for fiscal year 2019-2020 based on the TAC Chairs' recommendations, and staff administering and overseeing the research, and to charge staff with negotiating scoping, funding levels, and contracting as appropriate, and to ensure that UF works collaboratively with industry stakeholders on scoping and methodology.

MOTION—The Commission voted, 20 – 1 in favor, to approve funding research project priority #5 for fiscal year 2019-2020 based on the TAC Chairs' recommendations, and staff administering and

overseeing the research, and to charge staff with negotiating scoping, funding levels, and contracting as appropriate, and to ensure that UF works collaboratively with industry stakeholders on scoping and methodology.

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to approve funding research project priority #6 for fiscal year 2019-2020 based on the TAC Chairs' recommendations, and staff administering and overseeing the research, and to charge staff with negotiating scoping, funding levels, and contracting as appropriate.

XI. CONSIDERATION OF ACCESSIBILITY WAIVER APPLICATIONS

Justin Vogel, Accessibility Advisory Council legal advisor, presented the Accessibility Advisory Council's recommendations for all applications, and the Commission reviewed and decided on the Waiver applications submitted for their consideration.

Commission Actions Regarding Accessibility Waiver Applications:

1. Carpenter's Shop Center Inc. - Waiver 380 - 1601 University Blvd. N, Jacksonville 32211

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to grant the waiver based on the grounds of economic hardship.

2. Villa SoFi – Waiver 338 - 735 2nd Street, Miami Beach 33139

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to grant the waiver based on the grounds of technical infeasibility.

3. Bali Hai Beach Resort - Waiver 413 - 6900 Gulf Dr, Holmes Beach 34217

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to grant the waiver based on economic hardship.

4. New Mezzanine Office Addition for Prestige Packaging, Inc. – Waiver 358 - 17080 Alico Commerce Ct. Suite 1, Fort Myers 33967

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to grant the waiver based on the grounds of economic hardship.

XII. CONSIDERATION OF APPLICATIONS FOR PRODUCT AND ENTITY APPROVAL

Commissioner Stone presented the Product Approval Oversight Committee's recommendations for entities and product approvals on the consent agenda for approval, and Jeff Blair presented the recommendations for product approvals with comments and/or discussion.

Commission Actions on the Consent Agendas for Approval:

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to approve the consent agenda of product approval entities (8) as posted/presented.

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to approve the consent agenda of products (158) recommended for approval to the 2017 Code as posted/presented.

Commission Actions Regarding Product Approval Applications With Comments—2017 Code:

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to conditionally approve products FL 16291-R3 based on the conditions requested by the applicant and recommended by DBPR staff.

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to conditionally approve products FL 21044-R2 based on the conditions requested by the applicant and recommended by DBPR staff.

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to conditionally approve products FL 29985 based on the conditions requested by the applicant.

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to conditionally approve products FL 29991 based on the conditions requested by the applicant.

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to conditionally approve products FL 30314 based on the conditions requested by the applicant and recommended by DBPR staff.

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to conditionally approve products FL 30356 based on the conditions requested by the applicant and recommended by DBPR staff.

XIV. LEGAL REPORT

Justin Vogel, Commission Legal Counsel, reported that there were no pending legal matters of interest to the Commission.

XV. Consideration of Petitions for Declaratory Statements

Justin Vogel, Commission Legal Counsel, presented each declaratory statement in turn. Following are the actions taken by the Commission regarding the petitions for declaratory statements.

DS-2019-048 by WeCare Pediatric Extended Care, Corp.

Motion—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, not to accept the requested withdrawal of the Petition, and to approve the Fire TAC's and Special Occupancy TAC's recommendation on the Petition (staff's analysis).

XVI. BINDING INTERPRETATIONS #169 AND # 174 BRIEFINGS

Acting Chair Schock reported that Binding Interpretation #169 was petitioned by Caroline Shine regarding the City of Deltona Building Official's interpretation pursuant to Chapter 9 – Fire Protection Systems, Section 903.2 of the Florida Building Code, Building. The issue involves a petition for a binding interpretation on the BO's interpretation limiting the use of the building, church growth, and assembly.

Mo Madani briefed the Commission as follows:

Binding Interpretation #169: Answer: The Binding Interpretation Panel declined to answer these generic Building Code questions because they are too general in nature and do not address a specific interpretation by the building official and the jurisdiction, which is the intent of the binding interpretation process.

Acting Chair Schock reported that Binding Interpretation #174 was petitioned by HW Cecil regarding the Lee County Building Official's interpretation pursuant to Chapter 24 – Fuel Gas, Section G2408 of the Florida Building Code, Residential. The issue involves a petition for a binding interpretation on the BO's interpretation that the generator is in compliance with the FBC, and that the location does comply with the manufacturer's installation instructions.

Mo Madani briefed the Commission as follows:

Binding Interpretation #174: Answer: The Binding Interpretation Panel ruled that for Q1 based on the information presented, the generator does not comply with manufacturer's installation guidelines and location requirements. For Q2 the answer is yes the FBC, Residential requires compliance with all manufacturer's installation location requirements.

XVII. COMMITTEE REPORTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Acting Chair Schock requested TAC and POC chairs to confine their reports to a brief summary of any key recommendations, emphasizing any issues requiring an action from the Commission. The Chair requested if the TAC/POC requires Commission action, to frame the needed action in the form of a proposed motion. This will ensure that the Commission understands exactly what the TAC/POC's are recommending, and the subsequent action requested of the Commission. Acceptance of a committee report does not approve any recommendations contained within the report, and specific recommendations must be considered by separate motions. Special Occupancy TAC

Commissioner Whitehead presented the TAC's report and recommendations.

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 21 - 0 in favor, to accept the TAC's report as presented/posted (September 24, 2019).

Structural TAC

Commissioner Schock presented the TAC's report and recommendations.

Commission Action:

MOTION—The Commission voted unanimously, 20 - 0 in favor, to accept the TAC's report as presented/posted (September 25, 2019).

XVIII. COMMISSION MEMBER COMMENTS AND ISSUES

Acting Chair Schock invited Commission members to offer any general comments to the Commission, or identify any issues or agenda items for the next Commission meeting.

Commissioner Comments:

• Commissioner Schock: welcomed Chuck Fisher as the new electrical representative on the Commission.

XIX. GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT

Members of the public were offered an opportunity to provide comment during each of the Commission's substantive discussion agenda items. In addition, Acting Chair Schock invited members of the public to address the Commission on any issues under the Commission's purview.

Public Comments:

Bryan Holland, NEMA: recommended the Commisson convene a workgroup to review certain gaps in AHCA requirements in the Florida Building Code.

ATTACHMENT 4 FLORIDA BUILDING COMMISSION HISTORY AND OVERVIEW

HISTORY

Following Hurricane Andrew in 1992 and Hurricane Opal in 1995, Florida experienced record-breaking insurance losses resulting in a crisis affecting every homeowner in the state. The Governor appointed a Building Code Study Commission, The Florida Conflict Resolution Consortium designed and facilitated a two-year study and deliberation process with the 28 members representing a range of interests in the public and private sectors, through which the Commission evaluated the building code system.

The study revealed that building code adoption and enforcement was inconsistent throughout the state and even local codes thought to be the strongest proved inadequate when tested by major hurricane events. The consequences were devastation to lives and economies and a statewide property insurance crisis. The Commission recommended reform of the state building construction system which placed emphasis on uniformity and accountability.

The legislature enacted the consensus recommendations into law in 1998. In late 1998, the Consortium was asked by the Commission's chair to assist the newly created Florida Building Commission in its effort to build consensus for a uniform building code proposal. A complex consensus building process was put in place that included designing and facilitating meetings of 12 balanced technical advisory groups of 11 members each appointed by the Commission, as well as the Commission's meetings. The FCRC Consensus Center at FSU continues to work with the Commission by providing facilitation and consensus-building services.

OVERVIEW

COMMISSION REPRESENTATION. The Florida Building Commission is a 27-member representative stakeholder group who successfully created, implemented, and maintains the new statewide Florida Building Code. The Commission is comprised of the Chair, and 26 members appointed to represent specific stakeholder groups. They are as follows: four code officials, two state government representatives, a local government representative, a representative of persons with disability, a structural engineer, a mechanical engineer, representatives of fire protection technology, the building management industry, and the insurance industry, a general contractor, residential contractor, mechanical contractor, plumbing contractor, electrical contractor, roofing/sheet metal/air conditioning contractor, a manufactured building representative, a building product manufacturer, a swimming pool contractor, a representative of the green building industry, a natural gas system distribution representative, and a member representing the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' Office of Energy.

Consensus Process. The Florida Building Commission (FBC) seeks to develop consensus decisions on its recommendations and policy decisions. General consensus is a participatory process whereby, on matters of substance, the members strive for agreements which all of the members can accept, support, live with or agree not to oppose. In instances where, after vigorously exploring possible ways to enhance the members' support for the final decision on substantive decisions, and the Commission finds that 100 percent acceptance or support is not achievable, final decisions require at least 75 percent favorable vote of all members present and voting. This super majority decision rule underscores the importance of actively developing consensus throughout the process on substantive issues with the participation of all members and which all can live with and support.

The Commission's consensus process is conducted as an open public process with multiple opportunities for the public to provide input to the Commission on substantive issues. At each Commission meeting, the public is welcome to speak during the public comment period provided for each substantive issue under consideration, as well as general public comment periods provided at the end of each day's meeting. In addition to these opportunities for public input, most complex substantive issues before the Commission go through a consensus process where recommendations are developed by appointed representative stakeholder groups.

Since its formation in July of 1998, the Commission has demonstrated a commitment to working with affected interests to build consensus on complex issues. The adoption of the first edition of the Florida Building Code (2001 Edition), developed from September 1998 through January of 2001, involved 27 Commission meetings, dozens of facilitated public workshops and hundreds of TAC meetings. The Commission has consistently worked with all affected interests to build the best possible consensus-based decisions for the citizens of Florida. Through its committees and workgroups comprised of experts, the Commission has always developed its decisions based on the results of the best engineering and science available. Since 1999 the Commission has convened 64 special issue stakeholder workgroups to develop broad based consensus recommendations on issues of concern to stakeholders. Although the Code is by law a minimum building code, the Florida Building Code is the strongest consensus and science based building code in the country.
