OVERVIEW OF COMMISSION'S KEY ACTIONS AND DECISIONS

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 9, 2025

I. PLENARY SESSION SUMMARY AND OVERVIEW

The Commission conducted their December 9, 2025, Plenary Session meeting on-site in Orlando, Florida. At the December meeting the Commission considered and decided on Chair's issues and recommendations, Executive Director's announcements and discussions, applications for product and entity approvals, applications for accreditor and course approvals, application(s) for waiver(s) from accessibility requirements, a legal report, petition(s) for declaratory statement(s), and recommendations from the Commission's various committees and workgroups. Specific actions included voting unanimously to: **1)** Approve the Structural Integrity Reserve Study Form (SIRS); **2)** Approve the updated Workplan and Schedule for development of the 8th Edition (2023), Florida Building Code; **3)** Approve the updated Workplan and Schedule for development of the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code; **4)** Incorporate the Commission's approved glitch amendments into the 8th Edition (2023), Florida Building Code, to publish a Notice of Proposed Rule for Rule 61G20-1.001, and subsequently to proceed with rule adoption, and to delegate authority to Alan Burke to sign rulemaking documents on behalf of the Commission; **5)** Approve that the Standing Findings shall apply to all motions to approve proposed Code amendments (consent agendas and individually considered amendments); **6)** Approve DBPR Staff's recommendations regarding correlations and editorial fixes for the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code and to authorize staff to make correlations and editorial fixes as needed for the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code; and **7)** Proceed with rulemaking for Rule 61G20-1.001(1), Florida Building Code Adopted, for the purpose of adopting approved Code amendments into the Florida Building Code.

II. CHAIR'S WELCOME

Chairman Bourré welcomed the Commission, DBPR staff, and the public to the December 9, 2025 in-person session of the Florida Building Commission.

The Chair noted that the primary purpose of the December meeting was to consider and decide on regular procedural matters, updates, briefings, product and education course approvals, accessibility waivers, petitions for declaratory statements, and committee reports, and to conduct a rule workshop for Glitch Amendments for adoption into the 8th Edition (2023), Florida Building Code, and a rule workshop for approving modifications for inclusion in the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code.

The Chair noted, that as always the Commission would provide an opportunity for public comment on each of the Commission's substantive discussion topics. Chairman Bourré expressed that if a member of the public wishes to comment on a specific substantive Commission agenda item, they should wait until the facilitator requests public comment at the appropriate times during the meeting. The Chair noted that public input is welcome, but should be offered before the Commission begins discussion and/or there is a motion on the floor.

The Chair appointed Commissioner Bouza to the Product Approval POC to fill an open position. The Chair thanked Edward for agreeing to serve.

VII. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S ANNOUNCEMENTS AND DISCUSSIONS

Alan Burke, Executive Director, reported as follows:

A) Remaining 2025 Commission Meeting Dates

C) Structural Integrity Reserve Study Form (SIRS) Review and Approval

House Bill 913 (2025) directed the Division of Condominiums, Timeshares, and Mobile Homes (CTMH) to develop a standardized form for Structural Integrity Reserve Studies (SIRS) for condominium associations in Florida in coordination with the Florida Building Commission. In fulfilling this legislative directive, CTMH convened a dedicated work group to draft and refine the required form. The law requires that associations must obtain a new Structural Integrity Reserve Study (SIRS) at least once every 10 years for each building three or more habitable stories tall.

Throughout the work group's process, staff from the Florida Building Commission (Alan, Mo, Justin) were in attendance for every meeting. Their role was to observe and evaluate any potential impacts the proposed SIRS form might have on the Florida Building Code or the Commission's regulatory responsibilities. Because the form's purpose is administrative and financial and does not alter technical building standards, no code-related impacts were identified by staff.

The Chair explained that the finalized Form before the Commission requires Commission approval prior to CTMH adopting the Form by rule.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment, and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following action:

Commission Action:

MOTION – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 – 0 in favor, to approve the Structural Integrity Reserve Study Form (SIRS).

VIII. 8TH EDITION (2023), AND 9TH EDITION (2026), FLORIDA BUILDING CODE WORKPLAN DEVELOPMENT UPDATES

A) 8TH EDITION (2023), FLORIDA BUILDING CODE WORKPLAN UPDATE

Mo Madani provided the Commission with an update on the Workplan and Schedule for the Adopted 8th Edition (2023), Florida Building Code, and answered member questions.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment, and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following action:

MOTION – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 – 0 in favor, to approve the updated Workplan and Schedule for the Adopted 8th Edition (2023), Florida Building Code.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment, and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following action:

MOTION – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 – 0 in favor, to approve the updated Workplan and Schedule for development of the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code.

MOTION – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 - 0 in favor, to approval the consent agenda of product approval applications to the 2023 Code with comments recommended for conditional approval one (1) based on the conditions recommended by DBPR staff and reflected in the posted documentation (FL 47317).

Justin Vogel, Accessibility Advisory Council legal advisor, presented the Accessibility Advisory Council's recommendations for waiver applications, and the Commission reviewed and decided on the waiver application submitted for their consideration.

Commission Actions Regarding Accessibility Waiver Applications:

1. **DUGGER'S TROPICAL COTTAGES POST-DISASTER REBUILD (7 COTTAGE) – WAIVER 750 -**
2902 West Gulf Drive, Sanibel 33957
MOTION – The Commission voted, 10 – 4 in favor, to deny the waiver for vertical accessibility since the project in question is new construction.
2. **TRAYMORE HOTEL, LLC – WAIVER 752 -** 2445 Collins Avenue, Miami Beach 33140
The application was deferred at the Accessibility Advisory Council meeting, and no action was required.

XII. LEGAL REPORT

Justin Vogel, Commission Legal Counsel, updated the Commission on outstanding legal matters relevant to the Commission. Justin reported that there were no outstanding legal matters to report for the August 2025 meeting. Justin also indicated, that as always, he will update the Commission as matters arise.

XIII. PETITION(S) FOR DECLARATORY STATEMENT(S)

Justin Vogel, Commission Legal Counsel, presented each declaratory statement in turn. Following are the actions taken by the Commission regarding the petition(s) for declaratory statement(s).

Motion – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 - 0 in favor, to adopt the Mechanical TAC's recommendation that the Commission adopt staff's analysis, regarding the question(s) presented in the Petition.

2. DS 2025 – 052 by Richard Porter of CfiFOAM, Inc.

Motion – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 - 0 in favor, to the Energy TAC's recommendation that the Commission adopt staff's analysis, as amended by the TAC, regarding the question(s) presented in the Petition.

XIV. COMMITTEE REPORTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

TAC and POC chairs were requested to confine their reports to a brief summary of any key recommendations, emphasizing any issues requiring an action from the Commission. XV. RULE WORKSHOP ON RULE 61G20-1.001, F.A.C.: GLITCH AMENDMENTS TO THE 8TH EDITION (2023), FLORIDA BUILDING CODE

The Chair indicated that DBPR staff is recommending the Commission adopt five proposed Code changes to the 8th Edition (2023) Florida Building Code, as proposed by Staff, pursuant to Section 553.73(8), Florida Statutes and necessary for consistency with HB 551, HB 683, HB 913, and SB 180 as appropriate. The Chair noted that for the December meeting the Commission would consider and decide on the glitch amendments recommended by DBPR staff and the respective TACs for inclusion in the 8th Edition (2023), Florida Building Code.

At the Chair's request, Jeff Blair reviewed the procedural sequencing for the Commission's consideration of the proposed glitch amendment to the 8th Edition (2023), FBC.

Jeff Blair reviewed the procedural sequencing as follows:

Procedural Sequencing Overview:

- Jeff Blair reviewed the process for the Commission's review, and the criteria for proposed glitch amendments pursuant to the requirements of Section 553.73 (8)(b) and (a), F.S..
- Justin Vogel, the Commission's legal counsel, provided any legal clarifications and Mo Madani provided any technical clarifications requested by the Commission.

Glitch Amendment Consideration Process:

- There are five (5) Glitch Amendments (required for consistency with 2025 legislation) up for consideration.
- Review definition of Glitch Amendments.
- Facilitator will introduce each in turn.
- Proponent [DBPR Staff] of proposed Glitch Amendment will speak first, followed by other proponents. Public comment is limited to 3 minutes per person.
- Opponents of the proposed glitch amendments will follow proponents (3 minutes per person).
- The Commission will vote either to approve or deny the glitch amendments.
- Motions require a $\geq 75\%$ favorable vote for approval; those with less than a 75% favorable vote, are deemed denied.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment, and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following action:

Commission Action:

MOTION – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 – 0 in favor, to incorporate the Commission's approved glitch amendments into the 8th Edition (2023), Florida Building Code, to publish a Notice of Proposed Rule for Rule 61G20-1.001, and subsequently to proceed with rule adoption, and to delegate authority to Alan Burke to sign rulemaking documents on behalf of the Commission.

XVI. RULE WORKSHOP ON RULE 61G20-1.001, F.A.C.: COMMISSION REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF TACs' RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING PROPOSED MODIFICATIONS FOR INCLUSION IN THE 9TH EDITION (2026), FLORIDA BUILDING CODE

Chairman Bourré explained that the Commission started the 2026 Code Update Process in August of 2024 with selection of the 2024 I-Codes and the 2023 NEC, the TACs made recommendations on I-Code changes in September of 2024, the Commission decided on I-Code changes in December of 2024, the TACs made recommendations on proposed code modifications in June of 2025, the TACs decided on public comments to TAC recommendations and finalized their recommendations in October of 2025, and for the December meeting the Commission will decide on proposed code modifications for inclusion in the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code.

The Chair remarked, that as in previous years, as a courtesy to those who met the November 17, 2025 deadline, he decided to pull for individual consideration all of the amendments requested by staff as well as stakeholders meeting the deadline [#58]. Conversely, the Chair noted that he was discouraging the Commission from approving pulling any additional amendments requested during the meeting since it is disruptive, and commissioners, staff, and stakeholders have not had time to review the amendment(s), as they have for those amendments requested for individual consideration by the deadline.

The Chair noted that after the Commission takes action on the TACs' recommendations on proposed code modifications for inclusion in the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code, the Commission will move to proceed with rulemaking for Rule 61G20-1.001(1), Florida Building Code Adopted, incorporating all approved amendments. In addition, the Commission will conduct a Rule Development Workshop on the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code sometime around March of 2026.

At the Chair's request, Jeff Blair reviewed the procedural sequencing for the Commission's consideration of proposed modifications for inclusion in the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code.

Jeff Blair reviewed the procedural sequencing as follows:

Process Overview

The TACs' recommendations regarding proposed Code amendments for inclusion in the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code (2026 Code Update) are arranged on single tracking charts one per TAC as follows:

The TACs' Recommendations are on single Tracking Charts by TAC consisting of the: **1) Consent Agenda Recommended for Approval** (all modifications the TAC is recommending for approval either as submitted or as modified); **2) Consent Agenda Recommended for Denial** (all modifications the TAC is recommending for denial); and **3) Amendments pulled from the Consent Agenda(s) (for approval or denial) for Individual Consideration** by Staff and/or stakeholders [#58].

Prior to considering proposed Code amendments, the Commission will vote in favor of the motion that the standing findings apply to all motions to approve proposed Code amendments.

Procedural Sequencing

- Facilitator will introduce each "Consent Agenda Recommended for Approval" consisting of proposed Code amendments recommended for approval (as submitted and as modified), by each TAC in turn.

- Facilitator will subsequently introduce each “Consent Agenda Recommended for Denial” consisting of proposed Code amendments recommended for denial, by each TAC in turn.
- Facilitator will subsequently identify each Code Amendment Staff has pulled for Individual Consideration and those that stakeholders requested in writing by the deadline to be pulled for Individual Consideration, by each TAC in turn.
- The Chair agreed to pull all amendments requested by Staff and/or stakeholders who met the November 17, 2025 deadline set for requesting individual consideration **[#58]**.
- Commissioner(s) will decide which, if any, additional Code amendments to pull for individual consideration.
- Any Commissioner may pull any Code amendment for individual consideration.
- Public will have an opportunity to speak to any Code amendments they wish the Commission to consider individually if the amendment has not previously been pulled by the Commission for Individual Consideration.
- FBC will vote in favor of each “Consent Agenda Recommended for Approval,” by TAC in turn, as posted or as amended by the Commission’s removal of specific Code amendments recommended for approval.
- FBC will vote in favor of each “Consent Agenda Recommended for Denial,” by TAC in turn, as posted or as amended by the Commission’s removal of specific Code amendments recommended for denial.
- Facilitator will subsequently introduce each Code Amendment pulled by Staff and/or the Commission for Individual Consideration, by each TAC in turn.
- A Commissioner must move approval or denial of a proposed Code amendment and receive a second prior to discussion.
- All Code amendments pulled for individual consideration must be voted on individually either to approve or deny.
- Any Code amendment considered individually that receives a motion to approve but does not receive a second will be deemed denied for failure to receive a second.
- Motions either for approval or denial require a $\geq 75\%$ favorable vote for approval; those with less than a 75% favorable vote will be considered unapproved and the motion deemed denied.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment, and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following action:

MOTION— The Commission voted unanimously, 14 – 0 in favor, to approve that the Standing Findings shall apply to all motions to approve proposed Code amendments (consent agendas and individually considered amendments).

MOTION – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 – 0 in favor, to approve DBPR Staff’s recommendations regarding correlations and editorial fixes for the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code and to authorize staff to make correlations and editorial fixes as needed for the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code.

MOTION— The Commission voted unanimously, 14 – 0 in favor, to proceed with rulemaking for Rule 61G20-1.001(1), Florida Building Code Adopted, for the purpose of adopting approved Code amendments into the Florida Building Code.

XVII. COMMISSION MEMBER COMMENTS AND ISSUES

Commission members were invited to offer any general comments to the Commission, or identify any issues or agenda items for the next Commission meeting.

Commissioner Comments:

- Brown: Those who stayed to the end of the meeting, thank you.
- Brown: Regarding the WBD definition decision, consider the Code-Plus house and the Habitat for Humanity house in Mexico Beach that withstood the impacts of Hurricane Michael while other houses next to them failed. This was because these house exceeded the Code. Sometimes doing a little more to make a home stronger makes all the difference.
- Bouza: I was shown as absent for the PA POC minutes and I had not yet been appointed to the POC. Please correct this.

GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT

Members of the public were offered an opportunity to provide comments during each of the Commission's substantive discussion agenda items. In addition, for the "General Public Comment" agenda item, members of the public were invited to address the Commission on any issues under the Commission's purview.

Public Comments:

- Dottie Mazzarello, ICC: Appreciate Florida's commitment to quality Code development and keeping up with the Codes. Florida is a model for other states.
- Cade Booth, American Wood Council: We are deeply disappointed with the Commission's decisions regarding the heavy timber Code amendments. We reached out to commissioners and offered education and to answer questions and concerns. We have testing to support our products, FBC TAC approval, and support from BOAF. We feel the goal posts keep moving, and approval is not attainable. There is no technical basis for not supporting heavy timber in the FBC.

FLORIDA BUILDING COMMISSION HISTORY AND OVERVIEW

HISTORY

Following Hurricane Andrew in 1992 and Hurricane Opal in 1995, Florida experienced record-breaking insurance losses resulting in a crisis affecting every homeowner in the state. The Governor appointed a Building Code Study Commission, and the Florida Conflict Resolution Consortium designed and facilitated a two-year study and deliberation process with the 28 members representing a range of interests in the public and private sectors, through which the Commission evaluated the building code system.

The study revealed that building code adoption and enforcement was inconsistent throughout the state and even local codes thought to be the strongest proved inadequate when tested by major hurricane events. The consequences were devastation to lives and economies and a statewide property insurance crisis. The Commission recommended reform of the state building construction system which placed emphasis on uniformity and accountability. The Study Commission recommended a Florida Building Code System comprised of *Five Foundations for a Better Built Environment* described as: I. The Code; II. The Commission; III. Local Administration of the Code; IV. Strengthening Compliance and Enforcement; and, V. Product Approval.

The Legislature enacted the consensus recommendations into law in 1998. In late 1998, the FCRC Consensus Center at Florida State University was asked by the Commission's chair to assist the newly created Florida Building Commission in its effort to build consensus for a uniform building code proposal. A comprehensive and transparent consensus building process was put in place that included designing and facilitating meetings of 12 balanced technical advisory groups of 11 members each appointed by the Commission, as well as the Commission's meetings. Facilitated Solutions, LLC continues to work with the Commission by providing facilitation and consensus-building services using the same process and facilitator.

OVERVIEW

COMMISSION REPRESENTATION. The Florida Building Commission has consisted of as many as 27 members, and since January 1, 2021 is a 19-member building construction industry representative stakeholder group who successfully created, implemented, maintains, and updates the new statewide Florida Building Code. The Commission is comprised of 19 members appointed by the Governor to represent specific stakeholder groups. They are as follows: three municipal, county, or district code officials; an architect; a persons with disabilities representative; a structural engineer; an air conditioning or mechanical contractor, or mechanical engineer; an electrical contractor or electrical engineer; a manufactured buildings industry representative; a building products manufacturing industry representative; an insurance industry representative; a certified general or building contractor; a certified residential contractor; a plumbing contractor; a roofing or sheet metal contractor; a swimming pool contractor; a building products manufacturing industry representative; a natural gas system distribution representative; and the Governor's Chief Resilience Officer or designee.

CONSENSUS PROCESS. The Florida Building Commission (FBC) seeks to develop consensus decisions on its recommendations and policy decisions. General consensus is a participatory process whereby, on matters of substance, the members strive for agreements which all of the members can accept, support, live with or agree not to oppose. In instances where, after vigorously exploring possible ways to enhance the members' support for the final decision on substantive decisions, and the Commission finds that 100 percent acceptance or support is not achievable, final decisions require at least 75 percent favorable vote of all members present and voting. This super majority decision rule underscores the importance of actively developing consensus throughout the process on substantive issues with the participation of all members and which all can live with and support.

The Commission's consensus process is conducted as an open public process with multiple opportunities for the public to provide input to the Commission on substantive issues. At each Commission meeting, the public is invited to speak during the public comment opportunity provided for each substantive issue under consideration, as well as general public comment periods provided at the end of each meeting. In addition, most substantive issues before the Commission go through a technical advisory committee review or workgroup process where consensus recommendations are developed by appointed representative stakeholder interests, providing extensive opportunities for public input. In addition many of the Commission's decisions require rule development to implement, affording additional entry points for public input.

Since its formation in July of 1998, the Commission has demonstrated a commitment to working with affected interests to build consensus on complex issues. The adoption of the first edition of the Florida Building Code (2001 Edition), developed from September 1998 through January of 2001, involved 27 Commission meetings, dozens of facilitated public workshops and hundreds of TAC meetings. The Commission has consistently worked with all affected interests to build the best possible consensus-based decisions for the citizens of Florida. Through its committees and workgroups comprised of experts, the Commission has always developed its decisions based on the results of the best engineering and science available. Since 1999 the Commission has convened 70 special issue stakeholder workgroups to develop broad based consensus recommendations on issues of concern to stakeholders. Although the Code is by law a minimum building code, the Florida Building Code is the strongest consensus and science based building code in the country. The Insurance Institute for Business and Home Safety (IBHS) ranked the Florida Building Code as number one in their 2012, 2018, and 2021 assessments of residential building code enforcement systems for life safety and property protection in hurricane prone regions.

In summary, the Florida Building Commission provides a forum for stakeholders representing key interests to participate in a consensus-building process where issues affecting the construction industry are discussed and evaluated on their technical merits and cost-benefits to the citizens of the State of Florida. In addition, as a result of the Commission's proven consensus-building process and success in developing consensus on tough issues, the Florida Legislature frequently assigns policy issues to the Commission for evaluation and implementation.
