OVERVIEW OF COMMISSION'S KEY ACTIONS AND DECISIONS TUESDAY, AUGUST 12, 2025

I. PLENARY SESSION SUMMARY AND OVERVIEW

The Commission conducted their August 12, 2025, Plenary Session as a web and teleconference-based virtual meeting. At the August meeting the Commission considered and decided on Chair's issues and recommendations, Executive Director's announcements and discussions, applications for product and entity approvals, applications for accreditor and course approvals, application(s) for waiver(s) from accessibility requirements, a legal report, petition(s) for declaratory statement(s), and recommendations from the Commission's various committees and workgroups. Specific actions included voting unanimously to: 1) Approve the Commission meeting dates for 2026; 2) Approve the Commission's Fiscal Year 2024 - 2025 Annual Report (Report to 2026 Legislature), including Commission actions taken during the August 12, 2025 meeting, and to charge the Chair with reviewing and approving the Final Report prior to submittal to the Legislature and Governor; 3) Approve the updated Workplan and Schedule for development of the 8th Edition (2023), Florida Building Code; 4) Approve the updated Workplan and Schedule for development of the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code; 5) Adopt the revised TAC Final Recommendations to the Commission Code Amendments Review Process for development of the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code; 6) Deny Petitioner's request for a hearing before the Commission and to likewise decline to refer the case to the Division of Administrative Hearings, and to issue an Order to that effect; and 7) Conditionally approve Ekotrope Version 5.1 for demonstrating compliance with residential building energy requirements using the "Prescriptive Total UA Alternative Method", the "Performance Method -R405", and the "ERI Method – R406," subject to the applicant revising the submittal to address the comments provided by DBPR staff, and to authorize DBPR staff to approve non-consequential changes to the software as needed.

VIII. 8TH EDITION (2023), AND 9TH EDITION (2026), FLORIDA BUILDING CODE WORKPLAN DEVELOPMENT UPDATES

A) 8TH EDITION (2023), FLORIDA BUILDING CODE WORKPLAN UPDATE

Mo Madani provided the Commission with an update on the Workplan and Schedule for the Adopted 8th Edition (2023), Florida Building Code, and answered member questions.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment, and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following action:

MOTION – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 - 0 in favor, to approve the updated Workplan and Schedule for the Adopted 8th Edition (2023), Florida Building Code.

B) 9TH EDITION (2026), FLORIDA BUILDING CODE WORKPLAN DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

Mo Madani provided the Commission with an Updated Workplan for development of the 2026 Code Update Process – 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code, and answered member questions.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment, and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following action:

MOTION – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 - 0 in favor, to approve the updated Workplan and Schedule for development of the 9^{th} Edition (2026), Florida Building Code.

C) REVISED PROCESS FOR TACS' REVIEW OF PUBLIC COMMENTS AND FINAL RECOMMENDATIONS

Jeff Blair reviewed the proposed revision to the *TACs' Final Recommendations to the Commission Code Amendments Review Process* for development of the 9th Edition (2026), Florida Building Code, noting there was only one proposed revision.

The revision approved for the Code review processes is as follows:

Proponents/Opponents will be allowed one (1) collective two one-minute (1) counterpoint opportunity to address any new point(s) raised by previous speakers(s), but only if they address new points specific to the comment(s) raised by the speaker(s) and if they provide new points. No repeating of previous comments/points. It will be up to the proponents and the opponents to select one individual to make the counterpoint for their respective perspectives. Rebuttal is not an opportunity to expand on your position (support or denial)—Instead, it is an opportunity to rebut any new points made by the proponent or opponent.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment, and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following action:

Commissioner Hershberger presented the Product Approval Program Oversight Committee's recommendations for the consent agenda of entities recommended for approval to the 2023 Code, the consent agenda of products recommended for approval to the 2023 Code, each in turn.

MOTION – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 - 0 in favor, to approve the consent agenda of product approval entities for approval to the 2023 Code (20) as posted.

MOTION – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 - 0 in favor, to approve the consent agenda of products (168*) recommended for approval to the 2023 Code as amended.

Jeff Blair presented the product(s) pulled from the Consent Agenda for individual consideration.

MOTION – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 - 0 in favor, to conditionally approve product FL 47587 to allow the applicant to correct the installation drawings for .2, .3 and .4 so they are in sequence with the subsection numbers.

Commission Actions Regarding Product Approval Applications With Comments – 2023 Code:

MOTION – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 - 0 in favor, to approval the product approval applications to the 2023 Code with comments recommended for approval two (2) as reflected in the posted documentation (FL 47577, and FL 47541).

There were no (0) application(s) with comments recommended for conditional approval to the 2023 Code for the August 2025 Product Approval Cycle.

- 3. 2920 Interior Renovations Waiver 720 2920 SW 27th Avenue, Miami 33133 *MOTION* The Commission voted unanimously, 14 0 in favor, to grant the waiver for vertical accessibility on the grounds of technical infeasibility.
- **4. Dapper D's Cigars Downtown Waiver 722 -** 11 Ocean Street., Jacksonville 32202 *MOTION* The Commission voted unanimously, 14 0 in favor, to grant the waiver for vertical accessibility on the grounds of economic hardship.
- 5. **408** E 7th **Office Conversion Waiver 725** 408 E 7th, Tampa 33602 *Motion* The Commission voted unanimously, 14 0 in favor, to grant the waiver for vertical accessibility on the grounds of the historical nature of the property and technical infeasibility.

XII. LOCAL AMENDMENT CHALLENGE – CORRECTED APPEAL PETITION BY JACK A. BUTLER – PETITION FOR HEARING BEFORE THE COMMISSION

The Chair noted that the Commission had received a Petition for Hearing Before the Florida Building Commission, by Petitioner, Jack A. Butler, and requested that Jeff Blair review the procedural sequencing for the Commission's consideration of the Petition.

Jeff Blair reviewed the Procedural Sequencing the Commission used for consideration of the Petition as follows:

- 1) Justin Vogel, the Commission's legal counsel, will provide legal analysis as well as his legal opinion regarding the Commission's response to the Petition.
- 2) Mo Madani, the Commission's Technical Director, will provide technical information as requested by the Commission.
- 3) Commissioner Clarifying Questions to Justin regarding Legal Staff's Analysis and Opinion.
- 4) Petitioner's (Jack Butler, an individual) presentation of their Petition for Hearing Before the Florida Building Commission requesting the Commission refer Petitioner's challenge of specified Broward County local administrative amendments to the Division of Administrative Hearings (DOAH). [Seven (7) Minutes collectively for Petitioner's side]
- 5) Commissioner Clarifying Questions for the Petitioner.

- 6) Respondent's (Broward County Board of Rules and Appeals (BORA) Charles Kramer) response to the Petition for Hearing Before the Florida Building Commission. [Seven (7) Minutes collectively for Respondent's side]
- 7) Commissioner Clarifying Questions for BORA.
- 8) Public Comment is limited to *Three (3) Minutes/Person*.
- 9) Commission Discussion and Decision Regarding Responding to the Petition for Hearing Before the Florida Building Commission, and whether to refer Petitioner's challenge to specified Broward County local administrative amendments to DOAH.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment, and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following actions:

MOTION – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 - 0 in favor, to deny Petitioner's request for a hearing before the Commission and to likewise decline to refer the case to the Division of Administrative Hearings, and to issue an Order to that effect.

XIII. LEGAL REPORT

Justin Vogel, Commission Legal Counsel, updated the Commission on outstanding legal matters relevant to the Commission. Justin reported that there were no outstanding legal matters to report for the August 2025 meeting. Justin also indicated, that as always, he will update the Commission as matters arise.

XIV. PETITION(S) FOR DECLARATORY STATEMENT(S)

Justin Vogel, Commission Legal Counsel, presented each declaratory statement in turn. Following are the actions taken by the Commission regarding the petition(s) for declaratory statement(s).

1. DS 2025-019 by Larry Burchett

Motion – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 - 0 in favor, to adopt the Plumbing TAC's recommendation that the Commission decline to answer the Petition, since it asks the Commission to opine on the past actions of other individuals, seeks approval or disapproval of past conduct, and is suggesting changes to the Florida Building Code which must occur via the rulemaking process.

2. DS 2025-021 by Martin Aquatics

Motion – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 - 0 in favor, to adopt the Plumbing and Swimming Pool TACs' recommendation that the Commission adopt staff's analysis as revised by the TACs, regarding the question(s) presented in the Petition.

XV. BINDING INTERPRETATION #305 BRIEFING

Chairman Bourré reported that Binding Interpretation #305 was petitioned by Matthew Bechtel regarding the City of Cape Coral Building Official's (BO) interpretation pursuant to the 8th Edition(2023), Florida Building Code, Building, Chapter 1 Scope and Administration, Section 110.8 Special Inspections, Chapter 2 Definitions. The issue involves a petition for a binding interpretation challenging the BO's interpretation that the requirements of Section 110.8 Special Inspections

requiring special inspections for a threshold building are incorrectly being applied to a charter school which Petitioner asserts is not a threshold building.

Mo Madani reported the Binding Interpretation Panel's answer to Binding Interpretation #305 as follows:

- **Q1)** Is a large school auditorium associated with a Group E occupancy "charter school" that meets the area and occupant load thresholds as described in the definition of "Threshold building" of the Florida Building Code (FBC), Building, 8th Edition (2023) required to meet the requirements of section 110.8 of the FBC, Building?
- **A1)** The answer to the Petitioner's question is yes. Pursuant to the definition of the term "Threshold building" in chapter 2 of the Florida Building Code (FBC), Building, 8th Edition (2023), the school auditorium in question is a threshold building and would be required to meet the requirements of Section 110.8 of the FBC, Building.

XVI. ENERGY CODE COMPLIANCE SOFTWARE APPROVAL

The Chair stated that with adoption of each Edition of the Code the Commission is required to approve Energy Code compliance software for demonstrating compliance with the Updated Code.

For the August 2025 meeting the Commission was requested to approve an Energy Compliance Software submittal for demonstrating compliance with the 8th Edition (2023) Florida Building Code – Energy Conservation, specifically Ekotrope Version 5.1, for demonstrating compliance with residential building energy requirements using the "Prescriptive Total UA Alternative Method", the "Performance Method – R405", and the "ERI Method – R406".

The Energy TAC met on August 5, 2025 to review the submittal and voted unanimously to recommend conditional approval of the software.

Following the opportunity provided for questions and answers, public comment, and Commission discussion, the Commission took the following action:

Commission Action:

Motion – The Commission voted unanimously, 14 – 0 in favor, to conditionally approve Ekotrope Version 5.1 for demonstrating compliance with residential building energy requirements using the "Prescriptive Total UA Alternative Method", the "Performance Method – R405", and the "ERI Method – R406," subject to the applicant revising the submittal to address the comments provided by DBPR staff, and to authorize DBPR staff to approve non-consequential changes to the software as needed.

FLORIDA BUILDING COMMISSION HISTORY AND OVERVIEW

HISTORY

Following Hurricane Andrew in 1992 and Hurricane Opal in 1995, Florida experienced record-breaking insurance losses resulting in a crisis affecting every homeowner in the state. The Governor appointed a Building Code Study Commission, and the Florida Conflict Resolution Consortium designed and facilitated a two-year study and deliberation process with the 28 members representing a range of interests in the public and private sectors, through which the Commission evaluated the building code system.

The study revealed that building code adoption and enforcement was inconsistent throughout the state and even local codes thought to be the strongest proved inadequate when tested by major hurricane events. The consequences were devastation to lives and economies and a statewide property insurance crisis. The Commission recommended reform of the state building construction system which placed emphasis on uniformity and accountability. The Study Commission recommended a Florida Building Code System comprised of *Five Foundations for a Better Built Environment* described as: I. The Code; II. The Commission; III. Local Administration of the Code; IV. Strengthening Compliance and Enforcement; and, V. Product Approval.

The Legislature enacted the consensus recommendations into law in 1998. In late 1998, the FCRC Consensus Center at Florida State University was asked by the Commission's chair to assist the newly created Florida Building Commission in its effort to build consensus for a uniform building code proposal. A comprehensive and transparent consensus building process was put in place that included designing and facilitating meetings of 12 balanced technical advisory groups of 11 members each appointed by the Commission, as well as the Commission's meetings. Facilitated Solutions, LLC continues to work with the Commission by providing facilitation and consensus-building services using the same process and facilitator.

OVERVIEW

COMMISSION REPRESENTATION. The Florida Building Commission has consisted of as many as 27 members, and since January 1, 2021 is a 19-member building construction industry representative stakeholder group who successfully created, implemented, maintains, and updates the new statewide Florida Building Code. The Commission is comprised of 19 members appointed by the Governor to represent specific stakeholder groups. They are as follows: three municipal, county, or district code officials; an architect; a persons with disabilities representative; a structural engineer; an air conditioning or mechanical contractor, or mechanical engineer; an electrical contractor or electrical engineer; a manufactured buildings industry representative; a building products manufacturing industry representative; an insurance industry representative; a certified general or building contractor; a swimming pool contractor; a plumbing contractor; a roofing or sheet metal contractor; a swimming pool contractor; a building products manufacturing industry representative; a natural gas system distribution representative; and the Governor's Chief Resilience Officer or designee.

CONSENSUS PROCESS. The Florida Building Commission (FBC) seeks to develop consensus decisions on its recommendations and policy decisions. General consensus is a participatory process whereby, on matters of substance, the members strive for agreements which all of the members can accept, support, live with or agree not to oppose. In instances where, after vigorously exploring possible ways to enhance the members' support for the final decision on substantive decisions, and the Commission finds that 100 percent acceptance or support is not achievable, final decisions require at least 75 percent favorable vote of all members present and voting. This super majority decision rule underscores the importance of actively developing consensus throughout the process on substantive issues with the participation of all members and which all can live with and support.

The Commission's consensus process is conducted as an open public process with multiple opportunities for the public to provide input to the Commission on substantive issues. At each Commission meeting, the public is invited to speak during the public comment opportunity provided for each substantive issue under consideration, as well as general public comment periods provided at the end of each meeting. In addition, most substantive issues before the Commission go through a technical advisory committee review or workgroup process where consensus recommendations are developed by appointed representative stakeholder interests, providing extensive opportunities for public input. In addition many of the Commission's decisions require rule development to implement, affording additional entry points for public input.

Since its formation in July of 1998, the Commission has demonstrated a commitment to working with affected interests to build consensus on complex issues. The adoption of the first edition of the Florida Building Code (2001 Edition), developed from September 1998 through January of 2001, involved 27 Commission meetings, dozens of facilitated public workshops and hundreds of TAC meetings. The Commission has consistently worked with all affected interests to build the best possible consensus-based decisions for the citizens of Florida. Through its committees and workgroups comprised of experts, the Commission has always developed its decisions based on the results of the best engineering and science available. Since 1999 the Commission has convened 70 special issue stakeholder workgroups to develop broad based consensus recommendations on issues of concern to stakeholders. Although the Code is by law a minimum building code, the Florida Building Code is the strongest consensus and science based building code in the country. The Insurance Institute for Business and Home Safety (IBHS) ranked the Florida Building Code as number one in their 2012, 2018, and 2021 assessments of residential building code enforcement systems for life safety and property protection in hurricane prone regions.

In summary, the Florida Building Commission provides a forum for stakeholders representing key interests to participate in a consensus-building process where issues affecting the construction industry are discussed and evaluated on their technical merits and cost-benefits to the citizens of the State of Florida. In addition, as a result of the Commission's proven consensus-building process and success in developing consensus on tough issues, the Florida Legislature frequently assigns policy issues to the Commission for evaluation and implementation.
